
READING AGES


BOOK VENDING MACHINE






10 year-old Frank has trouble navigating his relationship with his younger brother Max who is autistic.


Frank longs for the brother he was promised by his parents before Max was born--someone who was supposed to be his biggest fan, so he could be the best brother in the world.





<u>CULTURE FOR READING</u>: All students in English have regular opportunities to read plays, poetry, novels and non-fiction. This year, we have seen how students' fluency, expression and vocabulary have improved with lots of students sharing their love for reading.

CURRICULUM: Students have risen to the challenge in studying an ambitious curriculum this year, learning about love potions and fairies in Shakespeare's plays, investigating crimes with Sherlock Holmes, dispelling the negative stereotypes of poor people in the Victorian era, or following the journey of immigrants onboard the Empire Windrush.

ENRICHMENT: Debate Mate has been a roaring success during this academic year!

A group of year 7 OCAers came together in order to learn a new skill and excelled in oracy and persuasion. Together, the students worked hard for our Debate Team and found a real passion for current events. Our weekly debates were widely successful within enrichment and after our dedicated debaters finished the course, they elected a team captain to continue to nurture these newfound skills on their own. Well done team!

TRIPS: A group of Year 10 students attended a taster session at Cronton College in June where they experienced an A-Level English Language lesson. The teacher was blown away by our students - both their maturity and insightful responses to some challenging material and questions. Here, the students embodied OCA's core values of excellence and aspiration.

CULTURE FOR READING: All students in English have regular opportunities to read plays, poetry, novels and non-fiction. This year, we have seen how students' fluency, expression and vocabulary have improved with lots of students sharing their love for reading.

LIBRARY: All KS3 students have taken part in lessons in the library where they have read a variety of fiction and non-fiction. Additionally, students have taken part in library challenges to win prizes and have their creative masterpieces on display. DEPARTMENTAL SUCCESSES & HIGHLGIHTS: 2021-2022






History department successes this year include the Holocaust survivor speech delivered to Year 9 students via Teams. This provided students with witness statement evidence to enhance understanding of the Holocaust and its impact.

In addition, a selection of Year 7 History students took part in the cross curricular enrichment project with MFL and English.

Miss Bell lead the session and provided materials for an informal book club with Year 9 and 10 students, focusing on historical fiction.

The department has created, implemented and reviewed new source and interpretation mastery sheets to enhance student understanding of these key features of the subject. Students have examined evidence independently, leading to stronger outcomes.

Max Barnes (ex student) is also due to speak to Year 10 History students on 7th July to discuss his progress to university. I can provide more after the event if required.



A recent fieldwork for Y10 geography students at Loggerheads country park was a huge success for not only the department, but all pupils involved, this was recognised by members of the public who commended our Y10 pupils on their polite, kind behaviour.



DEPARTMENTAL SUCCESSES & HIGHLGIHTS: 2021-2022





Other competitions were run through the year to promote student engagement including an Easter egg competition for KS3 and a code-breaking Christmas hamper competition for KS4.


PHYSICAL EDUCATION






