




















Task 1: Summer book challenge



How to complete:

- Read a chapter a day.
- Fill in a book journal after each chapter. This only has to be short but include details like character development and plot twists!
- Read atleast one book over summer (more if you wish!)
- Complete a book review at the end of each book. Include what you liked/dislike and rate your book out of 10.



Use the following guide to help you create your book journal. You can use a note pad, paper, card or anything you like.

Book journal example:

- Chapter number.
- Total time reading.
- Bullet point your thoughts.
- What happened in the chapter?
- Best bit- most enjoyable part?
- What do you think will happen next?
- Personalise your journal- you could include doodles, drawings, pictures, colour and stickers.







Task 2: Creative writing

•Opening:

Introduce the hero/main character and set the scene.

•Build up:

Introduce and build up the story. Perhaps there is a conflict or a mystery that needs to be solved?

•Problem:

Here, the story peaks. The main character faces a major problem, obstacle or dilemma.


•Resolution:

The main character solves the problem in order to reach their goal. Make this unusual and interesting so it keeps your readers on their toes!


•Ending:

The conclusion where everything is resolved. Keep it interesting and add an unexpected twist
