ASSESSMENT

The next whole school assessment window starts week commencing 26th February for 3 weeks. Timetables of your child's assessments will be sent home in the usual letter, alongside their Spring revision mats informing you of the topics covered this next term. The assessments they complete are cumulative, so you will need to refer to the Autumn term revision mats (topics) also. These can all be found on the school website, under curriculum and assessment.

☐ Encourage 100% attendance at all times so your child is not missing any learning time.
☐ Ensure your child has the correct equipment for school (pen, pencil, ruler, green pen, highlighter and calculator in a clear pencil case)
☐ Utilise the revision mats to recall the topics covered so far
☐ Check assessment timetables so you know what to revise for and when
☐ Encourage your child to independently revise and prepare for their assessments
using their knowledge organisers and lessons on Microsoft Teams.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Please do not drive down the school drive to collect your children at the end of the day. There are too many students exiting the school site to control traffic flow and your child's safety is paramount.

WHY ATTEND SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

Good school attendance will give your child the opportunity of success and help them develop the necessary skills for future life. Your child should attend school everyday unless there is an unavoidable cause such as illness.

Missing school damages a student's learning and their grades; research shows that missing 17 days (4 weeks) of school often leads to a drop of one full grade at GCSE, this can equate to 20 hours of English, 20 hours of Maths and 20 hours of Science missed. Absence also disrupts routines and can make a student vulnerable to crime.

WHY BE PUNCTUAL TO SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

School starts at 8.30am every day; students who are late are missing out on vital education that is covered in Morning Enrichment. Being on time sets students up for a positive start to the day and gives them the opportunity to discuss any concerns with their form tutor. Any student who arrives after 9am will be given a U code. This late code is classed as an unauthorised absence and could result in a fixed penalty notice. Remember, when students leave school we are often asked for references. The two main enquiries of employers and course providers are punctuality and attendance; not only will absences and lateness impact on grades and education, it could also impact on future education or job opportunities.

OUR OCA STANDARDS

As we venture into the New Year with the typical resolution of self-improvement and the hope of a positive year, this annual tradition is also reflected in OCA's school ethos of 'Age Quod Agis;' whatever you do, do it to the best of your ability!'

Therefore, as we enter the New Year we wish to reiterate the standards and expectations we have of all students upon their return to school in January.

UNIFORM & STANDARDS

We are proud of our OCA uniform as we believe that it is a presentation and reflection of ourselves. We have strict uniform policies that students are expected to adhere to.

As per the uniform policy, shoes must be plain black with no logos, in either leather or leather like material. Large decorative bows, flowers, logos or rings are not permitted. Training shoes (even plain black) are not permitted.

If a student arrives to the academy in incorrect footwear then they will be asked to change into formal footwear provided to them for the day. Their footwear will be taken until the end of the school day where they will be exchanged at 3pm. Please be assured that any footwear provided is clean and of good quality. We will not accept trainers as an alternative even if shoes are on order, as we have an adequate supply of new shoes in school.

All students must have the correct coloured tie for their year group; this is a gold tie for Years 7 and 8, a purple tie for Year 9 and 10 and a red tie for Year 11.

Coats may be worn to the academy and whilst students are outside on break and at lunch time. Whilst students move around the building, they are expected to carry their coat with them.

Hooded or tracksuit tops are not allowed to be worn by students at all in the academy; this includes before and after school, lunch time and breaks. Please do not send your child to school in one as these will be confiscated until the end of the school day. All students must wear a school blazer.

MAKE-UP AND HAIR STYLES

The school does not allow the wearing of any obvious make up. Nail varnish is completely banned and we will ask for it to be removed if worn. Acrylic nails should not be worn at any time and students will be asked to remove these. Eyelashes, semi or permanent and drawn on eyebrows are not allowed and students will be asked to remove them or rectify the matter before they can return to lessons. For Health and Safety reasons, and to support the general business-like values of the academy, we expect students to have reasonable hairstyles and colours. This means no extreme colours e.g. pink, blue, purple or bright red or extreme styles such as a number 1 haircut (skin head), track lines, rollers or pin curls. If the Principal, or a member of staff acting for the Principal, considers a student's hair style to be unreasonable, then the student will be asked to rectify the matter before they can return to lessons.

Any boy or girl with long hair that covers their faces will be asked to tie it back, with either a plain headband, bobble or clip. The clip must be plain, sparkly oversized clips will not be allowed.

Girls can wear small ribbons in hair however these must be black or the colour of their tie, they are not allowed to wear JoJo bows or any similar to this.

OUR OCA STANDARDS CONTD.

JEWELLERY

The academy has agreed that one small ear stud may be worn in the bottom of each ear. These must be a plain gold or silver stud. Students will be asked to remove their earrings if they do not comply with the academy regulations, this includes removal of earrings from the top of ears.

Apart from this, for Health and Safety reasons and to promote the general business-like values of the academy, no other jewellery apart from a wrist watch may be worn. This includes rings, neck chains, bracelets and facial piercing such as nose, tongue and lip studs. If a student has jewellery on, it will be confiscated.

EQUIPMENT

All students MUST bring a 'School Bag' to school every day. A 'School Bag' is defined by the academy as a bag which is suitable to carry books of up to A4 size, basic equipment and kit (including trainers/football boots) for other subjects.

They must all have a clear pencil case (these are the only type they can take into an exam) this must contain pens, pencils, ruler, rubber, highlighters, protractor and compass. It is very important where possible that students also have a calculator (Casio FX-83GTX). It is vital that students come prepared.

DRINKS

Students are only allowed to bring a reusable drinks bottle; however this must not contain fizzy or energy drinks. Any other bottles or fizzy or energy drinks will be confiscated and will not be returned.






CRONTON SIXTHFORM

COLLEGE



Year 9 students have had a brilliant time doing their in house work experience. Students have assisted in the library, with the site maintenance team, first aid and the IT team!














TRIPS, VISITS & THE COMMUNITY!




WEAVER HALL
