OCA CHALLENGES

Our OCA challenges continue to motivate and reward students. This weekly challenge focuses on our top school priorities of attending school and being punctual, alongside encouraging a positive learning environment through achieving grades 1 and 2 for attitudes to learning, learning multiple Epraise points and refraining from receiving any behaviour points. This weekly challenge is competitive amongst each form within their year group; the top 3 forms earn points and rewards! The form at the top of the leader board by the end of the year will receive a trip in the Summer term. Details to follow! Please encourage your child to embrace this challenge and become a successful member of their form.

WHY ATTEND SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

Good school attendance will give your child the opportunity of success and help them develop the necessary skills for future life. Your child should attend school everyday unless there is an unavoidable cause such as illness.

Missing school damages a student's learning and their grades; research shows that missing 17 days (4 weeks) of school often leads to a drop of one full grade at GCSE, this can equate to 20 hours of English, 20 hours of Maths and 20 hours of Science missed. Absence also disrupts routines and can make a student vulnerable to crime.

WHY BE PUNCTUAL TO SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

School starts at 8.30am every day; students who are late are missing out on vital education that is covered in Morning Enrichment. Being on time sets students up for a positive start to the day and gives them the opportunity to discuss any concerns with their form tutor. Any student who arrives after 9am will be given a U code. This late code is classed as an unauthorised absence and could result in a fixed penalty notice.

Remember, when students leave school we are often asked for references. The two main enquiries of employers and course providers are punctuality and attendance; not only will absences and lateness impact on grades and education, it could also impact on future education or job opportunities.

Miss Lyne who organised the trip said the pupils were outstanding!














