


WELCOME TO THE INFORMATION NEWSLETTER APRIL2024

WHY ATTEND SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

School engagement will give your child the opportunity of success and help them develop the necessary skills for future life. Your child should attend school everyday unless there is an unavoidable cause such as illness. Missing school damages a student's learning and their grades; research shows that missing 17 days (4 weeks) of school often leads to a drop of one full grade at GCSE, this can equate to 20 hours of English, 20 hours of Maths and 20 hours of Science missed. Absence also disrupts routines and can make a student vulnerable to crime.

School starts at 8.30am every day; students who are late are missing out on vital education that is covered in Morning Enrichment. Being on time sets students up for a positive start to the day and gives them the opportunity to discuss any concerns with their form tutor. Any student who arrives after 9am will be given a U code. This late code is classed as an unauthorised absence and could result in a fixed penalty notice. Remember, when students leave school we are often asked for references. The two main enquiries of employers and course providers are punctuality and attendance; not only will absences and lateness impact on grades and education, it could also impact on future education or job opportunities.

OPTIONS EVENING



WORLD BOOK DAY

World Book Day is an annual event that celebrates authors, illustrators and our favourite books and characters. More than 100 countries across the globe participate in events to encourage reading.

The day encourages more children and families to find enjoyment in reading. UNESCO, which promotes global education, culture and heritage, created the annual event on April 23, 1995.



The theme this year was Read Your Way, encouraging children and young people to discover reading on their terms. This year, the official World Book Day website states: "World Book Day doesn't suggest a theme, instead we hope that schools and families encourage children to read for pleasure, focussing on the 6 elements of reading for pleasure."

The six elements are: Being read to regularly, having books at home and at school, having a choice in what to read, finding time to read, having trusted help to find a book and making reading fun.

This year at OCA our library turned into the Mad Hatter's Tea Party in celebration of Lewis Carroll's Alice in Wonderland. As a reward for excellent attitude to learning and engagement, many Year 7s were invited to take part in various activities in the library as well as a tea party! And of course, many staff dressed up as their favourite character or something/someone relevant to their subject!



Sparx Reader

Sparx Reader has already been launched with students in school time and in Years 7-9 and next term it will be used to complete weekly one hour reading homework. Please see below for a letter to parents regarding Sparx Reader:

Dear Parents,

Developing a love of reading continues to be a key aspect of our curriculum intent at OCA and we are always keen to develop new strategies to support students' reading. This term, we have partnered with Sparx Learning, to start using their new platform, Sparx Reader. Sparx Reader is an online platform which provides students with access to a wide range of age-appropriate eBooks and helps to promote careful, focused reading.

Students can log into Sparx Reader using their existing Sparx Maths details or by using Microsoft 365 log in from the OCA homepage, via any device with internet access. More detailed visual log in information follows on the next page. Once logged in, students will be able to choose from a range of eBooks selected based on their own reading ability.

Each week, students' English teachers will set them a homework task, which will require them to complete one hour of careful reading of one of the books from the eBook library. As students read, they will answer questions generated by Sparx Reader, to ensure that they are reading carefully. This homework will be set on a weekly basis each Wednesday and students will have until the following Wednesday to complete the reading homework.

We encourage you to watch a series of short videos explaining what Sparx Reader is, how it works and how you can support your child with developing their reading, this guidance is available via the QR code:

We are very excited about this opportunity to further develop students' reading skills, and enable them to become more confident, fluent readers. Please see a number of ways that you can support your child with their reading:

• You can help by providing a quiet space and a set amount of time for your child to focus on their reading homework each week.



• The best way to support your child is to ask them about the book they're reading; which aspects they're enjoying, which characters and events they've recently read about or what they think could happen next.

How can I monitor the reading my child is doing?

- You are able to keep track of your child's reading by clicking through the link to the Parent Portal in your Sparx Maths weekly homework email.
- On the Parent Portal, you can choose to view homework progress for any Sparx Learning system your child is using. For Sparx Reader, you can see progress with the current and previous homeworks and browse books that your child has been reading as part of their current homework.
