

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Section C Interpretations of History

You will have an *interpretation* to examine about the 'Roaring Twenties' in the USA. Why is the opinion offered to you accurate? Does it match what you know about the experiences of people in America during this decade? You have to explain why the interpretation is accurate! Knowledge to help you! The 19020s was a period of tremendous change and new found freedoms in America. The American economy boomed, fuelled by a growth in wealth, consumerism, easy credit, and confidence. Women experienced new found freedoms, and there was a huge growth in the entertainment industry, from films to music, dance and sports. But it was time of intolerance towards Black Americans and immigrants. Prohibition led to gangland violence, as men like Al Capone gained huge wealth from the supply of illegal liquor (alcohol), as well as being involved in prostitution, racketeering and blackmail of the police and judiciary in Chicago.

Section D Source Utility

You will have a source about the work of stretcher bearers on the Western Front in WWI to look at. What does this source show, (we call this the content of the source)? How useful is the source, thinking about the provenance of it? Provenance means the type of source, is this helpful to understand the challenges of rescuing injured soldiers? Look at when the source was produced, (its origin), why was the source produced, (Its purpose)? Are these useful when studying this topic? You have to explain why the source you are looking at is useful if we are studying the challenges posed by the muddy and wet terrain of the Western Front.

Knowledge to help you! The Western Front was the area in Northern France and Belgium during WWI. It rained a lot here, especially in the winter, making the ground muddy and soggy. The artillery shells used by the Germans caused huge craters, which could fill with water. The constant barrage churned up the ground. Many soldiers died from drowning in the wet and the mud.
